Payne County Youth Services continue our long and exemplary history of receiving a 100% Compliance rating along with Commendations on Peer Review by the Oklahoma Association of Youth Services and the Oklahoma Office of Juvenile Affairs Monitoring.

## THE NEW NORMAL

As we have all adapted to the “new normal” of living in a pandemic-affected world, PCYS has continued to provide all services and has fully returned to all services in-person and available via telehealth as needed. Adaptations were made when the pandemic began and will continue to be viable options to reducing barriers to services for many. School-based and site-based services continue to move seamlessly for the needs in each community and for each family served. The Emergency Youth Shelter has remained operational in all program areas, while additional programs continue to follow CDC guidelines as precautions and along with the medical and safety realities of the moment.

Many mental health and substance abuse counselors have either retired or moved into private practice since the onset of the pandemic. PCYS, like most providers in the area, region, and across the country, struggle to employ enough licensed counseling staff to meet the ever-increasing demand for our services. We invite you to continue to advocate for funding for counseling and all services needed by our neighbors and schools. In the first two weeks of our area public schools being fully open, PCYS experienced a surge in children and youth accessing the Safe Place program, serving nine youth in two weeks. Prior to the pandemic, this same number of youths would typically access Safe Place over an average of a 3-month period. Emotional dysregulation, suicide risk, social-media based bullying and safety issues, abuse and neglect remain as significant issues.

PCYS continues to be dedicated to our Mission and to ensuring our life-saving services are available to the children, youth, and families we serve. We are grateful to our supporters, board members, schools, community partners, state, federal, and local grantors, and the community, and ask for your continued advocacy, support, and input as to our services and needs. ## FY2021 PROGRAM OUTCOMES AND OUTPUTS—July 1, 2020-June 30, 2021

**All programs continue to adapt to any challenges of the COVID-19 pandemic with no suspension of services and the addition of new programs.**

**Emergency Shelter** – The Emergency Youth Shelter provides a safe place to stay for youth in crisis, protecting children and youth from child abuse, neglect and trauma. In FY2021, 127 young people stayed a total of 2,281 days in the Shelter. Average length of stay was 24 days, with some residents staying over a year.

**Mental Health and Substance Abuse Counseling** – Individual family and group counseling helps clients work through issues and meet goals. The program counseled 169 youth and their families, improving their functioning and quality of life. Available in-person and teletherapy.

**Community Education/Development** – Provides opportunities and information to the community in order to work collaboratively in support of youth and families, thus creating a more productive and healthy community. These services were presented to 20,000 people for 6,000 hours. Available in-person and teletherapy.

**Skills for Success/First Offender Program** – A program for youth who have violated or are at-risk for law-violation, this program reduces future penetration into the Juvenile Justice System and enhances communication and relationships within families. 5 youth and their parents/guardians were served by the program. The PCYS program demonstrated a success rate of 96% with only 4% penetrating further into the Juvenile Justice System. Available in-person and teletherapy.

**Safe Place** – Safe Place ensures young people in crisis can get help 24/7/365. 26 youth accessed Safe Place in FY2020. Safe Place information and training provided to students across our 7 school systems. The knowledge and courage for youth to advocate for their safety and that of their peers is strengthened by this program. Safe Place sites total 54 in 6 communities, as well as 20 rolling sites with the OSU BOB's Bus Transit System, which create a county-wide safety net where children and youth get help fast.

**Case Management** – Case management services assist clients and their families to connect with their community and better implement skills learned in programming. 1,470 hours of case management were provided to clients across programs.

**Victims of Crime (VOCA) Services** – 340 clients were served by this program. VOCA services empower and engage clients to process and recover from abuse, neglect, and trauma and advocates for victims' rights and needs.

**Prevention Programming – Art** – 17 youth participated in the PCYS Art, Photography and Poetry Contest. This contest provides opportunities and supports to youth to express themselves appropriately. Performance feedback and prizes are provided. A new Poetry Slam Program served 5 youth.

**Transitional Living Program** – TLP provides intensive support for youth transitioning into adulthood by protecting youth from the risks of homelessness, teaching life skills, counseling, fostering independence and permanent connections and facilitating successful independent living. TLP served 20 clients during FY2021.

**Botvin Life Skills** – An evidence-based curriculum provided to Stillwater Public Schools Middle School students, this program assists youth to learn skills that enhance appropriate behavior, critical thinking, and decision-making and builds supportive substance abuse prevention skills. 455 youth benefited from Life Skills Education.

**Building a Competent Community for Suicide Prevention**—Uses evidence-based curriculum to provide training to adults to be “gatekeepers” to identify, intervene, and assist persons contemplating suicide. 606 individuals were trained in FY2021.

**Training** – PCYS staff benefited from 528 hours of specialized, program-specific training to ensure quality interventions. Staff provided training to others for 22 hours

### **Performance Measures for Counseling Program**

**Effectiveness** — Effectiveness is measured in counseling progress using an industry-standard assessment, the Client Assessment Record. 76% of clients showed an improvement on this measure. While this measure demonstrates a lack of goal attainment, the first 2 quarters of the fiscal year (prior to the COVID -19 pandemic) the measure was met with a 1.5 point average decrease in the CAR score. This excludes the few who demonstrated no change as a result of coming to the mental health assessment only.

**Accessibility of Services** – Accessibility of services is measured by the length of time it takes from a person's initiation of a services request until they are contacted by PCYS, with a goal of 15 days. Our output measure is 87.2%. Services available in-person and teletherapy.

**Client Satisfaction** – Client satisfaction is measured using a scale of 0-5 on a set of questions with 5 being the most favorable response. Responses averaged 4.6 on this measure.

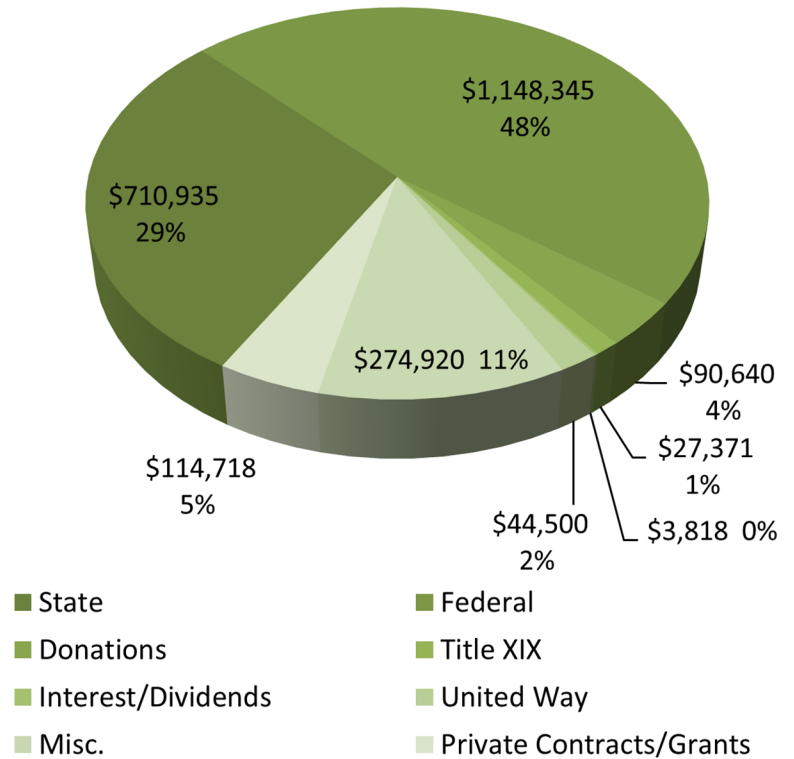

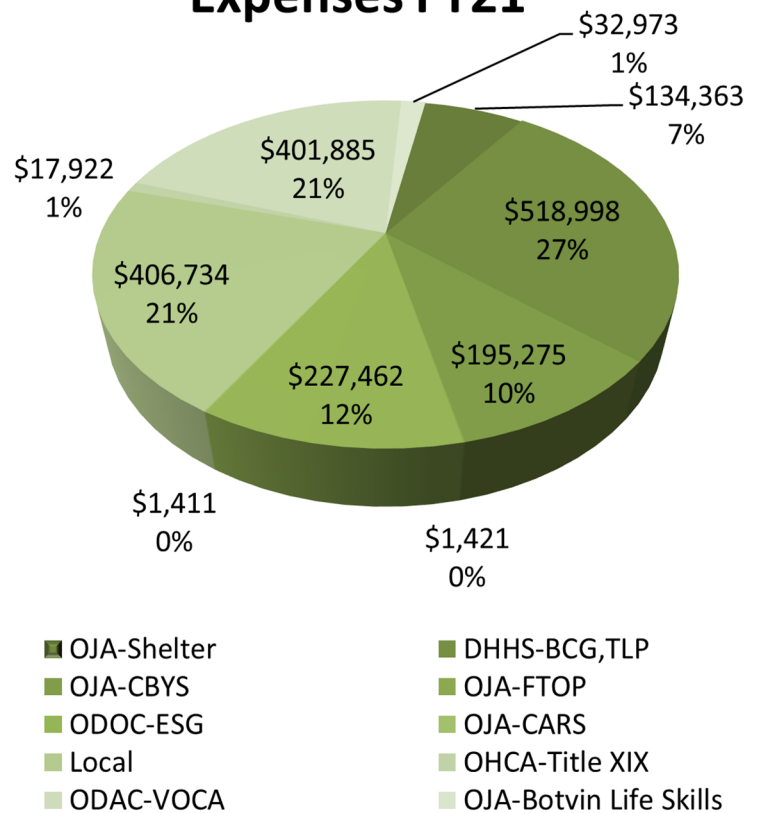

## Expenses FY21





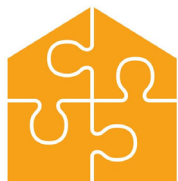
## FY2021 PROGRAM HIGHLIGHTS

July 1, 2020-June 30, 2021



### MENTAL HEALTH AND SUBSTANCE ABUSE COUNSELING AND CRISIS SERVICES

The PCYS Counseling Program provided mental health counseling and crisis services across Payne County and surrounding areas. School-based services increased access to counseling while highly trained clinicians utilize a variety of evidence-based, trauma-informed interventions to children, youth and families. Telehealth and in-person counseling were and remain available.



### TRANSITIONING INTO ADULTHOOD

The Payne County Youth Services Transitional Living Program continued with 20 adults placed in apartments. Clients pursue educational and employment goals as well as receive individualized case management, counseling, and supportive services. Several clients successfully completed the program moving into full time employment, post-secondary education, and their own apartments.



### PARENTING EDUCATION AND SUPPORT

The Payne County Youth Services evidence-based Parenting Education and Support classes continued both in virtual and in-person formats. Parents learned to better communicate with their teens, parent for prevention, and identify supports and challenges of parenting today.



### NATIONAL SAFE PLACE WEEK CELEBRATED

PCYS celebrated National Safe Place week from March 21-27, 2021. Safe Place is a nationally acclaimed outreach program that makes help readily available to young people in crisis. Payne County Youth Services has operated the Safe Place program for Payne County since 1996. Payne County currently has 54 Safe Place sites and 20 OSU buses that carry the Safe Place sign.



## FY2021 COMMUNITY EDUCATION/DEVELOPMENT HIGHLIGHTS

### FUNDING RECEIVED TO CONTINUE SUICIDE PREVENTION PROGRAM

PCYS was granted an additional \$20,000 from the Sarkeys Foundation to continue the *Building a Competent Community for Suicide Prevention* community training, adding training directly to students and youth, while continuing the adult training program. PCYS also observed National Suicide Prevention Week, September 6-12, 2020.

### SAFE SITTER/ SAFE@HOME PROGRAMS

Supported in part by Stillwater Medical Center, PCYS added two new evidence-based curriculum training programs for grades 4-6 and 6-12, preparing youth to provide safe and appropriate child care in their own home or even building a babysitting business. This evidence-based program targets harm reduction for both child abuse and exploitation.



### I AM THE FUTURE

The 13th Annual *Voices of Today Art, Poetry, and Photography Contest* was held with 17 participants. The theme for this year's contest was *I am the Future*. Participants explore and refine skills and talents, express thoughts and ideas in positive, age-appropriate ways.



## EMERGENCY YOUTH SHELTER

The PCYS Emergency Youth Shelter is so much more than a bed and a meal. When a child or youth is in residence at our shelter, they receive counseling, tutoring, medical evaluation, attend public school, many have a part-time job, learn life skills, go on outings, and participate in recreational and other activities, provided school supplies, and much more.

Volunteers from the Stillwater Lowe's Store #0241 selected PCYS as their Heroes Project, updating landscaping, repairs to facility interior, updating outdoor lighting, and other projects.

## VICTIMS OF CRIME ACT

## VOCA SERVICES CONTINUE

Serving Victims of Crime is something that Payne County Youth Services has done well for over 48 years. This year the VOCA grant award was \$312,343, which will continue to allow PCYS to expand victim services. VOCA funds are administered by the State of Oklahoma through the Oklahoma District Attorney's Council.



## STILLWATER CHRISTMAS PARADE

PCYS received a donation from the entry fees of the annual Christmas parade to support programming and client needs.



## CITY OF STILLWATER

PCYS received a contract from The City of Stillwater in the amount of \$15,000. This contract supports crisis intervention, counseling and sheltering clients, as well as the general operations of the organization.

PCYS received a grant of \$40,000 from the Faye Allene Rife Brown Foundation. 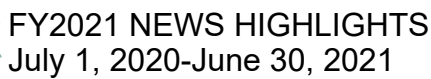
